Introduction

CHILD WELFARE

2.1 CHIEF MINISTER'S GIRL CHILD PROTECTION SCHEME

1 Year of 2001-2002

Commencement

2 Objective of the

Scheme

To promote education of girl children, to eradicate female infanticide, to discourage the preference for male child and to promote the small family norm.

3 Eligibility of the

Scheme

- 1. The parent should have one or two girl children and no male child.
- 2. Either of the parent should have undergone sterilization within the age of 35
- 3. Annual income of the parent should not exceed ₹72.000.
- 4. The age of the child should be less than 3 years at the time of enrollment, in respect of scheme-I and the age of second child should be less than 3 years in respect of scheme -II.
- 5. The parents/ grand parents should be a domicile of Tamil Nadu for a period of 10 years at the time of submitting the application.

Quantum of Assistance: 4 Scheme-I:-

An amount of ₹50,000 is deposited for 18 years in the name of the girl child born on or after 01.08.2011, in the form of fixed deposit with the Tamil Nadu Power Finance and Infrastructure Development Corporation Limited, for a family with one girl child only. The copy of the fixed deposit receipt is given to the family of the girl child.

Scheme-II:-

An amount of ₹25,000 is deposited for 18 years in the name of the each girl child born on or after 01.08.2011 in the form of fixed deposit with Tamil Nadu Power Finance and Infrastructure Development Corporation Limited, for a family with two girl children only. The copy of the fixed deposit receipt is given to the family of the girl children.

From 23.5.2016 onwards 1Sovereign (8 grm) 22 carat gold coin is given in addition to the financial assistance of ₹25,000 / ₹50,000.

2 Objective of the Scheme

to promote the educational status of the poor girls and also to help poor parents in getting their daughters married.

- 1. Belongs to a poor family
- 2. Annual family income should not exceed ₹72,000
- 3. Only one girl in a family will be given the benefit
- 4. Bride should have completed 18 years and Bridegroom should have completed 21 years of age. There is no upper age limit.






Nutrition Status of Normal Children

7.14 TAMIL NADU SOCIAL DEFENCE WELFARE FUND FOR WOMEN & CHILDREN

1 Aim of the Scheme

To provide assistance for self employment to the Girls and Women discharged from the Children / Special Homes and Vigilance / Protective Homes.

2 Eligibility

Girls and women committed under the provision of Immoral Traffic (Prevention) Act, 1956 and Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection of Children) Act, 2015 admitted into Vigilance/Protective Homes and Special/Children Homes.

3 Quantum of Assistance Tamil Nadu Social Defence Welfare Fund for Women & Children was created in the year 2002, to provide infrastructural facilities to the institutions, education assistance to orphan/destitute children and to provide financial assistance not exceeding Rs.5000/- (or) material assistance not exceeding Rs.10,000/- to the discharged Children under Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection of children) Act, 2015 & provisions under Immoral Traffic (Prevention) Act, 1956 and petty repairs and construction works in the existing buildings not exceeding Rs.20,000/- per annum in an institution, providing sports and recreational materials to the institutions, and other expenses in the best interest of the children. The fund is administered by the Governing Board, consisting of the Secretary to Government, Social Welfare & Nutritious Meal Programme Department as Chairperson, the Director of Social Defence as Member Secretary and the Deputy Secretary to Government, Finance Department as Member.

4 Beneficiaries So far 153 girls and women have benefited under the scheme.

7.15 Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS).

The Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India has introduced in 2009, a Centrally sponsored scheme, with focus on children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law - the Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS).

8.2 <u>Distress Relief Scheme</u>

On the natural death of the primary bread winner of the family, the assistance is being paid to the legal heir of the deceased who is below poverty line. The Government have enhanced the relief amount from ₹10,000/- to ₹20,000/- from 31st December 2015.
