

**Hon'ble Minister for Revenue and Disaster Management Department briefing  
to the media about the Preparedness for NEM 2017.**

**1. Multi-Purpose Evacuation Shelters (MPES)**

Under Coastal Disaster Risk Reduction Project (CDRRP) 121 Multipurpose Evacuation Shelters were proposed at a total expenditure of Rs.345 crores. Out of the above, 115 have been completed. In normal times, a MPES functions as a School Building or Primary Health Centre (PHC) or as a Community Hall. These MPES are designed with separate rooms for accommodation, medical examination and arrangement for sanitation.

1. Apart from the above facilities additional kitchen facilities are provided in the MPES and can function as Community Halls.
2. These MPES can accommodate 500 to 2000 people.
3. The above centres were constructed at a cost of Rs.315 crores

## **3. Formation, Procurement of equipment and training to TNDRF:**

Government orders will be issued shortly for the formation of a dedicated force with a strength of 1000 Police personnel named Tamil Nadu Disaster Response Force (TNDRF) (by Converting the TSP XIII Battalion Poonamalee at Avadi) and Rs.14.59 Crores for purchase of equipment and Rs.0.41 Crores for capacity building will be sanctioned under State Disaster Response Fund as per the announcement of Hon'ble CM on the floor of the Assembly under Rule 110.

4. Extension of Relief Assistance for victims of area specific Disasters such as Sea Erosion, Lightning, Thunder, Whirl wind and Gale wind under State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF):

The Government of Tamil Nadu have in a historic move ordered vide Government order No.246, Dated:03.08.2017 for the inclusion of area specific disasters such as Sea Erosion, Lightning, Thunder, Whirl wind and Gale wind in the list of items which are eligible for relief under State Disaster Response Fund. The relief amount for different categories is detailed given below:

## 5. Community Participation

The Community participation is ensured at grass roots level through enrolment of able bodied volunteers. The volunteers from local community are identified from NSS, NCC, and Youth Groups with skills of swimming and climbing, as First Responders (at least 10 per vulnerable area) and form First Responder teams in areas of vulnerability (for search, rescue and evacuation).

Committees for Early warning, Search, Rescue & Evacuation, First Aid, Shelter and Relief (Food, Water and Sanitation) have been formed at Community level for each of very high and high vulnerable areas and coastal habitations. Transport arrangements to serve those areas have been made.

Women volunteers are also included in First Responders Teams and also in other Committees. The first responders are trained by Fire & Rescue Department / SDRF or Red Cross society / Civil Societies.

Mobile teams of first responders and Snake catchers at Taluk / Sub-Divisional and District levels formed for deployment based on need.

Vibrant NGOs, Capable Volunteers from Local Community willing to participate in Search, Rescue and Evacuation operations are being identified. Data of the NGOs & First Responders is being prepared and to be hosted on the District Web-site.

## Capacity Building

1. Mock Drills involving First Responders and members of other committees were conducted in coordination with Police, Fire & Rescue Department and other vital line departments, with participation of community.
2. Drivers / conductors of all Transport Corporations are being sensitized regarding their role during flood situation not only to safe guarding their interest but also to offer better service to the public during emergency.

### **Involvement of Multiple Stake holders**

Meetings conducted at District Level with Hospitals, Educational Institutions, Communication Service providers and Oil Companies to ensure institutional preparedness with strategies to ensure round the clock functioning of emergency and essential services.

### **AAPDA MITRA Scheme:**

The scheme for training of 200 Community volunteers in disaster response in selected 30 most flood districts of India in 25 States and that the Chennai has been identified district in Tamil Nadu as indicative of 30 most flood prone districts of India.

1. MoU has been signed between NDMA and SDMA for the implementation.
2. 200 Volunteers identified in Chennai city.
3. Tamil Nadu Fire Services Training Institute at Tambaram selected as a Training Institute for training of above community volunteers.
4. The first installment of Rs.22.70 Lakhs has been allotted.

### **Community Based Disaster Risk Management (CBDRM) ( Rs.15.00 Crores)**

The program has been designed to help communities better utilize risk mitigation infrastructure and work together with local governance system while mobilizing themselves to be better prepared as well as respond to any disaster event. The CBDRM programme will be implemented by the Rural Development & Panchayat Raj Department through State Institute of Rural

Development at a cost of Rs.15.00 Crores. The major activities taken up under this are:

- a) Risk and Vulnerability Assessments.
- b) Community Mobilization and Capacity Building.
- c) Linking Communities to DWAS and Evacuation Shelters and
- d) Capacity Strengthening for Emergency Response.

### **Objectives of CDDRM**

- To reduce communities vulnerabilities and strengthen their ability to proactively cope with disasters and natural hazards, through preparation of Village Disaster Risk Reduction Plans.
- To form Village Disaster Management Committees and to sensitise all the stakeholders towards the need for disaster management. It also proposes to form various teams and train them aspects of early warning, search rescue and evacuation and first aid in the event of a disaster.
- To make the communities aware of the infrastructure created under CDRRP and to maintain and utilize the same during emergency.

Under CBDRM Orientation training, Disaster Preparedness Disaster awareness, Swimming, First Aid, VDRMP, Mock drill, Street Play, Shelter management and other heads, training were provided for 4413 batches consisting of 2,77,530 Persons. The total expenditure as on 31.08.2017 is Rs.7.46 Crores.

## **6. Measures taken to ensure normalcy in Public life during Disasters:**

### **Instructions to the Oil Companies:**

The Oil Companies have been instructed to stock adequate quantity of diesel. The problems faced by them during previous occasions in movement of Fuel etc. should be addressed with the help of Police, and Highways.



### **Instructions to the Mobile Operators:**

The Mobile operators have been instructed to ensure backup arrangements, adequate service personal to restore connectivity and to ensure service without any disruption.

### **Instructions to Educational Institutions:**

The Educational Institutions have been instructed to take up adequate safety measures in Schools such as Checking up Electrical connections, Installations, cleaning and closing of open drains, Pits, Pruning of branches of trees, Cleaning of clogged drains in the terraces, Clearing of Stair cases, identifying weak and dilapidated structures and strictly to avoid them. The Institutions were also instructed to educate students about Do's and Don'ts on all aspects of Safety.

### **Instructions to Hospitals:**

The Government / Private hospitals have been instructed to

1. Ensure power backup arrangements particularly to ICU / CCU's.
2. Position sufficient Stock of Oxygen Cylinders, Emergency Medicines Lifesaving Equipment in working condition and adequate Quantity of Diesel for Operating Generators.
3. The Generators of adequate capacity should be positioned at an elevated place preferably in first floor to ensure power back up.

## **7. Arrangements at Relief Centres**

### **General**

1. Buildings suitable for organizing relief camps in village / Town Panchayats / Municipalities with necessary contact details, in addition to the regular cyclones centers and Multipurpose Evacuation Shelters identified.

2. Necessary repairs taken up in cyclone shelters and kept ready for organizing relief camps. 3 to 4 Collection points for easy and efficient collection and local distribution of Relief materials identified.
3. Proper security arrangements made in Relief Centres.
4. Generators ready to be used for relief operations and in relief camps.

### **Water, Sanitation and Hygiene**

1. Adequate supply of drinking water of good quality in the Relief Centers being ensured.
2. Adequate no of toilets, including temporary toilets are being made available.

### **Food & other arrangements at Relief Centers:**

1. Air dropping of food and essential commodities in inaccessible areas.
2. Providing Cooked or dry food at the Shelters as per norms prescribed.
3. Providing Sufficient clothing and blankets to the affected people.

### **Health:**

1. Adequate stocks of essential medicines, life-saving drugs, etc., being ensured.
2. Prior arrangements for scheduled visit of Doctors and display their contact numbers for any emergency being arranged.
3. List of ambulances of both with Government Agencies and the Private Sector enlisted.

### **Special Care for Women, Senior Citizens and Differently abled:**

1. Proper arrangements for vulnerable sections like differently abled, Senior Citizens Women and children etc. being done.
2. Warm and inner clothes and additional clothes to Children, sick, elders, women and widows being arranged.
3. Sanitary napkins for women / girls being arranged with disposable paper bags.

4. For pregnant woman, necessary basic arrangements being made by the local administration for safe delivery.
5. For lactating mothers special care to be taken to provide milk powder etc.,
6. Wheel chairs to be kept ready at relief centers to help aged differently abled persons.

**Animal Care:**

The availability of adequate stocks of medicines in Veterinary Hospitals and fodder & water in cattle camps/shelters being ensured.

**8. Procurement of additional VHF Sets:**

Rs.81.98 Lakhs have been sanctioned for the procurement of New Very High Frequency(VHF) Sets (Base station – 65 and Mobile station - 75) and also Annual Maintenance contract for the existing VHF Sets (Base station – 387 and Mobile station - 403) in the Coastal and Non Coastal Districts from the State Disaster Response Fund.

**9. Deployment Plan for Prepositioning of Men and Material:**

1. Plans prepared to preposition basic relief materials and first aid in buildings identified as Relief Centers in Areas of very high and high vulnerability.
2. Deployment plan prepared in consultations with Superintendent of Police, Fire Service, Fisheries and others for prepositioning of rescue teams, boats, Armed Reserved Police, Patrol Vehicle etc.,
3. Traffic plan being prepared to establish green corridor for quick movement of rescue teams and relief measures, fuel, LPG and other essential materials in the areas of very high and high vulnerability
4. patrolling to prevent possible threat of looting and arson by anti-social elements in areas where evacuation is to be undertaken.
